From the President/CEO



Amidst the change and challenges of FY 2016, our Wyandot, Inc. family of agencies sought and succeeded in creating new opportunities to fulfill our core mission as community mental health providers. We supported this mission in the face of unanticipated and unprecedented financial challenges to the community mental health system across the state.

Yet, like the community we serve, we are resilient and remain focused on providing the best care and treatment possible for our consumers. Because of the dedication of our staff, Wyandot, Inc. continues to develop and provide noteworthy, innovative programming and outstanding service.

Through the generosity of funders and private donors, we opened the new Robert's Place children's emergency shelter on the heels of a very successful \$1.1 million capital campaign. A major donor, along with support from other benefactors and community agencies, stepped forward and made it possible for us to re-open Frank Williams Housing Resource Center to serve persons who are homeless.

RSI, our 24/7/365 stabilization center for adults experiencing mental health and substance abuse crises, is recognized across the state as the new model for emergency psychiatric care. At RSI's second anniversary celebration, we received word that the state of Kansas has extended funding of the crisis center through June 2018.


We have enhanced services directed toward suicide prevention through a new community partnership and the Zero Suicide initiative. With other grant funding, we were able to introduce new programs – early intervention for young adults with psychosis and intensive services to help high-need consumers secure and retain housing. Kim Wilson Housing has had a major role in helping coordinate collaborative efforts to reduce homelessness among students in Kansas City, Kansas Public Schools. PACES developed plans to offer expanded therapy services in Johnson County in fall 2016 through a partnership with Sunflower House, Shawnee, Kan.

Throughout this past year, members of our boards of directors, management and staff held true to our values. We rallied around our mission. And we demonstrated movement toward our vision of supporting *Healthy minds*. *Healthy lives*. *Thriving community*. We're pleased to acknowledge and celebrate our successes, service and progress in this *Annual Report*. Thank you.

Service enhancements

- > Wyandot Center's Crisis Stabilization House reopened in July 2015 after extensive renovation. The house provides 24/7 care and support to help adult consumers who are experiencing acute psychiatric crises avoid hospitalization.
- > A successful \$1.1 million capital campaign culminated in the opening of Robert's Place on Aug. 31, 2015 to serve youth removed from their homes due to suspected abuse and to provide respite for PACES consumers. In FY 2016, Robert's Place served 411 youth.
- > Adolescents and young adults with early symptoms of psychosis continue to benefit from the emerging best practice treatment model introduced by the grant-funded Early Intervention Team of Wyandot Center and PACES.
- Previously identified as an outreach center, Frank Williams Housing Resource Center (FWHRC) adopted a new name and targeted focus to help people transition from homelessness to being housed to having a home. After a two-month closure due to budget constraints affecting this unfunded program, FWHRC reopened in April 2016 thanks to the generosity of major donors. On average, 75 persons visit the center each weekday between 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.
- > Wyandot, Inc. agencies became part of the grant-funded Zero Suicide initiative. The UMKC School of Medicine Psychiatry Department is the lead for this research-based program to reduce the number of suicides among targeted populations through enhanced assessment and intervention strategies.
- RSI celebrated its second anniversary with the great news that the state has extended funding of this pilot program through June 2018. The 24/7/365 stabilization center serves adults experiencing mental health and substance abuse crises.
- > Community partners rallied around 1400 Diplomas, the program to decrease homelessness among students of the Kansas City, Kansas Public Schools. Kim Wilson Housing partnered with Avenue of Life, the school district and Unified Government Mayor/CEO Mark Holland to bring awareness to the issue and to increase emergency assistance to families that are experiencing homelessness.





Kim Wilson Housing hosted a forum in which Mandy Chapman Semple, special assistant to the Houston mayor, shared her expertise on system reform and ways to coordinate efforts to address homelessness. Tim Spilker, CEO, UnitedHealthcare Community Plan of Kansas, attended and visited with Mandy.

- > Wyandot Center received one of three grants awarded by the state to develop intense and integrated outreach to persons who are chronically homeless with dual diagnoses of mental illness and substance use disorders. Staff operationalized the Cooperative Agreements to Benefit Homeless Individuals (CABHI) grant in January 2016 and succeeded in housing 19 clients through August 2016.
- > High-need consumers of Truman Behavioral Health, Kansas City, Mo., continued to avoid hospitalizations, emergency room visits and incarcerations through the service enriched housing initiative (previously called RESCA). Staffed and managed by Wyandot Center in collaboration with Kim Wilson Housing, this program improved quality of life for consumers and resulted in estimated savings of \$195,000 (April 2015 through mid-June 2016).
- > Efforts continued across the Wyandot, Inc. family of agencies to foster a trauma-informed care approach through training and creation of a safe and welcoming environment. Extensive use of art supported these efforts during the past year.

- > PACES, Robert's Place and Wyandot, Inc. President/CEO Randy Callstrom received the Ad Astra Trailblazer Award from the Kansas Housing Resources Corporation at its annual conference in August 2015.
- > RSI and the Kansas City, Kansas Police Department received the first-ever Excellence in Collaboration Award presented by Nonprofit Connect on May 20, 2016.
- > Wyandotte County's Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) efforts merited a community partner award from In The Word Ministries in October 2015. CIT equips law enforcement officers with skills to work with individuals with mental illness. Wyandot, Inc. is a collaborating partner in this initiative. In FY 2016, 171 officers and 15 dispatchers trained in CIT.
- > For the second consecutive year, Wyandot Center's Supported Employment Program achieved exemplary status on the fidelity scale for following best practices to help adult consumers find and retain competitive employment.
- Her support of communications and development projects earned Monica Horvat recognition as Wyandot, Inc. Volunteer of Year during a program hosted by United Way of Wyandotte County in April 2016.
- > Sunflower House named Amanda Adkinson, PACES therapist, its Wyandotte County Child Advocate of the Year in April 2016. Amanda serves referrals from the non-residential children's advocacy and abuse prevention center.


